CAPE TOWN: Independent Democratic leader Patricia de Lille called on President Thabo Mbeki and IFP leader Mangusutho Buthelezi to "lower the political temperature in Kwazulu-Natal, whjere tension among ifp, Anc supporters are threateneing to boil over". According to De Lille opposing parties, jostling for power in Kwazulu/Natal, would "stop at nothing to achieve their votes."

She was speaking – during the second day of debate on President Mbeki's state

of the nation address.

De Lille said strong political was needed in the fight ahainst HIV-Aids, addling the government shouldemulate the "new breed of heros" such as sisulu Walter and N Mandela, who spoke openly about HIV-Aids.

"I do not understand why our president refuses to take lesons from other African leaders who were to reduce their infection rate

through directly leading the war over HIV-Aids." Meanwhile Azapo deputy president Phandelani Nefolovodwe called onwhitesto share their wealth with the black people of the land they called home.

He also critisized "white" political parties for for "opposing land Restitution".

"You should not be prepared to support black people in their stuggle to get their land back,"
