Developing a search strategy

When confronted with the need to locate information through a search engine, one should realize that principles that were used in traditional libraries still hold. The essential difference is that search engines yield results quickly and in large quantities. The strategy used is not rigid. The research must: -

- Define the subject of interest
- Select key words or phrases
- Build a thesaurus – chain of relevant keywords.
- Alternatively the reader can consult published thesaurus such as search list of subject headings or the List of subject headings.
- These publications are not easily available to lay people.
- The best approach is to use a personally developed thesaurus.
- Selected keywords are then entered to initiate the search for relevant information.
- Evaluation and refinement may be necessary.

E-resources and using online search engines

- From the perspective of NUST, e-resources can be accessed through approved databases.
 - Relevant pamphlets are issued by the NUST Library and students are advised to obtain a copy.
 - Information can also be accessed through search engines such as Google, Google Scholar, Yahoo, Bing, Ask and other similar search engines.
 - Note that access to information tends to be a function of purchase or subscription by the library.
